"I'm glad it was me (not any of my family) because I knew I could handle it''

I recently celebrated my 65th birthday (an age that I wasn't sure I'd ever reach) and with this milestone I have decided that I would like to share my story in the hopes that someone may identify with it and that it offers hope and support.

My name is Sharon Mascarin and I have been a member at Gilda's Club Barrie since 2012. To say that I have looked death in the face a few times in the last fourteen years would be an understatement.

- *I was first diagnosed with Chronic Lymphocytic Leukemia on April Fools Day, 2009. I didn't have to receive chemotherapy until June 2012, but then I endured six months of treatment at RVH.*
- I was sick as a dog for three days after the treatment, welcoming the three weeks I had to bounce back before the next round. I joined Gilda's Club because I was coming to Barrie for treatment anyway and was a huge fan of the philosophy of fellow patients supporting each other.
- I've had **two relapses with my leukemia since 2012** and fortunately have a great oncologist and team who has saved my life and I'm now on a treatment that keeps me stable.
- I was diagnosed with **Stage 1 Breast Cancer in March 2019**. I had surgery and a month of radiation and have been well since then.

To say that I almost gave up would also be the truth. But what's kept me going is my stubbornness, my determination and the love for my family. I have a wonderful husband and two grown sons who were just teenagers when I was first diagnosed.

I wasn't giving into this disease because I had good men to raise and stuff to do!

Gilda's Club provides support and comfort in a way that nothing else can. You can meet with people who speak your language because they too are members of the cancer club you never wanted to join.

I am part of an exclusive club that no one wants to be a part of, but the caring and support makes a world of difference. I know it helps so many and I am thankful for what has been there for me when I needed it most.
